WHERE THE CIDER APPLES GROW!

On what proved to be a very popular venue for Whitley WI's August Outing, 35 members headed off to The Apple Barn at

Dunham Massey, to learn how apple juice and cider are produced, as well as sampling the produce. There was a warm welcome from owners Chris and Alison Hewitt, where samples of two varieties of apple juice were enjoyed - Jazz and Smiths.

During the sampling, owner Chris talked to the group about the history of this 'hiddenaway' apple farm. His family have had over 100 years' experience of growing apples there. Grandad Kenneth started fruit and vegetable farming on the Sawpit Street site



early in the last century. Chris and his dad Alan continued restoring the land to traditional orchards. They now grow 76



which now covers 33 acres.
Full encouragement has been given to the business by their landlord who is the National Trust.

Following the apple juice sampling, members headed

outside to view a small section of these orchards. The richly clovered grass surrounding the trees brought back happy memories to one member of her childhood, where she grew up on an apple farm in Herefordshire. It is demanding work being an apple farmer, especially during harvest and pruning times, where these tasks are undertaken by hand, not with machinery. The next part of the visit took place in the huge shed where the apple press was located along with the cider fermentation equipment and bottling plant. All processes were explained to members, who listened with interest, whilst enjoying samples of two varieties of cider. The shed was more like a party room than a working business, due to the presence of a bar lit up with fairy lights and bunting.

Following a quick visit to the shop to buy bottles of apples and cider, members then headed back through the narrow lanes to the Jolly Thresher Public House in Lymm.

A two-course evening meal was served, this was enjoyed by all, as well as a chance to chatter. Thanks were given to the staff at the Thresher for their excellent service.
